



Gambling Act 2005 – occasional use notices

Occasional use notice

Where there is betting on a track on eight days or less in a calendar year, betting may be permitted by an occasional use notice (OUN) without the need for a full premises licence.

The following information provides guidance in respect of OUNs, advice is also provided by the Gambling Commission.

The meaning of 'track' covers not just horse race courses or dog tracks, but also any other premises on any part of which a race or other sporting event takes place. Land which has a number of uses, for example agricultural land upon which a point-to-point meeting takes place, can qualify for OUN provisions. The track need not be a permanent fixture.

The intention is to permit licensed betting operators (with appropriate permission from the commission) to use tracks for short periods for conducting betting, where the event is of a temporary, infrequent nature.

The OUN dispenses with the need for a betting premises licence for the track in these circumstances.

OUNs may not be relied upon for more than eight days in a given calendar year.

The giving of notice

A notice must be served by a person who is responsible for the administration of events on the track or by an occupier of the track.

The notice must be served on the licensing authority and copied to the chief officer of police for the area in which the track is located. The notice must specify the day on which it has effect.

Notices may be given in relation to consecutive days, so long as the overall limit of eight days is not exceeded in any calendar year.

Determination

Provided that the notice will not result in betting facilities being available for more that eight days in any calendar year, there is no provision for counter-notices (the police) or objections to be submitted. This means that the notice is deemed as satisfactory and the event can proceed.

The licensing authority will acknowledge satisfactory receipt in the above situation.

An event that does not meet the above criteria will be rejected and will be unable to proceed.

Fees

There is no fee for an occasional use notice.

Notice period

Whilst the Gambling Act 2005 does not require a minimum notice period to serve an OUN on the Icensing and police authorities, we would appreciate at least five working days before the planned event.

Register

Current notices and those previously given can be viewed on the public register.
